3. RECEIVE A WELCOME FROM THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION OF SOUTHERN NEVADA

Comments:

** Mr. Tom Warden arrived at 3:09 p.m.

Ms. Tina Quigley, General Manager for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), welcomed the Transportation Resource Advisory Committee and Community Collaboration (TRAC or Committee) back from the break. She thanked the Chair Don Snyder and Mr. Thom Reilly for presenting TRAC's roadway recommendations to each of the jurisdictions. She commented on how progress was made on some of the recommendations and staff would provide an update on those areas.

Next, Ms. Quigley described the upcoming TRAC meetings, noting that the discussions would focus on transit planning, emerging transportation technology and how those will shape conversations in the future.

Ms. Quigley invited Committee members to the *Disruption Ahead – How New Transportation Technologies Will Impact Southern Nevada* summit, featuring insights from Paul Godsmark, a futurist and expert on transportation technology. The event, she said, would be held on October 24, 2016 at 7:00 a.m. at the Innevation Center. She noted that this would be the first in a series of these conversations.

Chair Don Snyder encouraged Committee members to attend and gain a better understanding of some of the dialogue occurring in the transportation industry. He emphasized the importance of hearing from different sides of the issues. Ms. Quigley mentioned that there would be guest speakers at future TRAC meetings to discuss the transit plans in other regions.

Next, Chair Snyder welcomed the Committee back and introduced new members.

4. RECEIVE A RECAP ON ROADWAY RECOMMENDATIONS MADE AT THE JULY 14, 2016 MEETING OF THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION OF SOUTHERN NEVADA BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Comments:

Chair Don Snyder recounted the presentation he and Mr. Thom Reilly made to the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC) Board of Commissioners (Board). He explained that he and Mr. Reilly presented the Transportation Resource Advisory Committee and Community Collaboration (TRAC or Committee) recommendations to the Board. Chair Snyder explained that he and Mr. Reilly were directed to present the information to the different jurisdictions. They attended various board, council and commission meetings of the jurisdictions.

Thom Reilly related how the jurisdictions appreciated the participation of the Committee, noting it was an important issue to deal with. He said the jurisdictions inquired as to how transportation values and the rankings were determined. Overall, he continued, the jurisdictions were very supportive of the work done by the Committee. He said they were interested in the feedback the Committee will provide regarding transit.

5. RECEIVE AN OVERVIEW OF THE TRAC AGENDA

Comments

Mr. Thom Reilly reviewed the Transportation Resource Advisory Committee and Community Collaboration (TRAC) transit goals, which included: 1) Learn about the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC) transit system, as well as transit systems of other western regions; 2) Explore new transportation technologies being used in other communities as well as emerging transportation technologies on the horizon; and 3) Provide community feedback and input on the future of transit in Southern Nevada. He then explained that TRAC would receive a legislative update. He announced that Mr. Bruce Woodbury and Mr. Jacob Snow would present on the evolution of transit in Southern Nevada. After, he continued, Ms. Tina Quigley, General Manager for the RTC, would discuss emerging technologies. Finally, he said, Mr. Raymond Hess, Director of Planning for the RTC, would discuss High Capacity Transit Plan.

6. RECEIVE A LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVES UPDATE (FOR POSSIBLE ACTION)

Comments:

Helen Foley, Faiss Foley Warren, explained that the Nevada Legislature has statutory committees that are ongoing, interim committees that examine different issues when the Legislature is not in session. She noted that there is not a committee on transportation. In response to Nevada's needs, she continued,

Nevada State Senator Mark Hammond is working on developing this interim transportation committee that would be able to convene during the year to discuss transportation infrastructure. This interim transportation committee would be ideal to propose legislation for a roadway user fee for plug-in electric vehicles.

** Ms. Virginia Valentine arrived at 3:25 p.m.

Ms. MaryKaye Cashman interjected that the state could tax electric vehicles at quick charge stations if they were installed. Ms. Foley suggested that this was an ideal topic for the proposed interim transportation committee.

Chair Don Snyder recalled discussing the \$100.00 electric vehicle fee at a previous Transportation Resource Advisory Committee (Committee or TRAC) meeting. He asked for a reminder as to how a proposed electric vehicle fee compared to the Fuel Revenue Indexing (FRI). Mr. Marc Traasdahl, Director of Finance for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), responded that the average driver would contribute approximately \$340.00 per year through FRI. Chair Snyder commented that \$100.00 was a reasonable amount to charge drivers of all electric vehicles.

Moving on, Ms. Foley asked the Committee members to engage in the upcoming 2017 session of the Nevada Legislature through testifying and support of these transportation issues. She then introduced Nevada State Senator Mark Manendo.

Senator Manendo thanked the Committee members for their commitment to transportation, explaining his and Senator Hammond's commitment to transportation. He noted that he worked alongside Senator Hammond to move transportation forward in Nevada. He expressed that he and Senator Hammond were committed to further advance the transportation conversation in the 2017 Nevada Legislature, should both be re-elected. He asked for the Committee members to help with that and to explore all possibilities for transportation. He emphasized that the assistance and support of the Committee was imperative to accomplishing this, inviting the Committee members to visit Carson City during the legislative session.

Chair Don Snyder wondered if there was a possibility for electric vehicles use the High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) lanes, noting this was allowed in some states. Ms. Quigley remarked that this would be a great topic for the proposed Interim Transportation Committee to discuss.

Item:

7. RECEIVE A PRESENTATION ON THE EVOLUTION OF TRANSIT

Comments:

Following a detailed PowerPoint presentation [attached], Mr. Bruce Woodbury, former Chair of the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC) Board of Commissioners (Board) and current member of the Las Vegas Monorail Board of Directors, provided a brief history of the public transit in Las Vegas.

To begin, Mr. Woodbury stated that the RTC was created in 1965 by the Nevada State Legislature, noting

it operated as the Regional Streets and Highways Commission with funding from a one-cent gas tax. Then in 1981, he explained, the RTC was designated as Southern Nevada's Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), which is a congressional designation for the agency responsible for receiving and distributing federal transportation funding for both roadways and transit. He noted that at this same time, Las Vegas Transit was running the public transit system. He presented a commercial used by Las Vegas Transit.

Mr. Woodbury said it was a limited system, but at the time was a pretty good system. Chair Don Snyder asked if it was for profit. Mr. Woodbury replied affirmatively.

Then, Mr. Woodbury described the Las Vegas Transit route system. He explained that the routes were on a loop system with a central hub, noting that all roads led to Downtown Las Vegas. He said that riders were routed through Downtown Las Vegas before going anywhere else in the Las Vegas Valley. This was inefficient for riders. He shared the example that if a rider was at Rainbow Boulevard and Flamingo Road, wanting to go to the Craig Road area, the rider would have to go to the Downtown Transportation Center and get a transfer onto the Craig Road route.

In 1983, Mr. Woodbury explained, the RTC was authorized by the Nevada State Legislature to run public transit. In 1984, a transit funding measure for a quarter cent sales tax was put to a vote of the people, but it ultimately did not pass.

In 1985, Mr. Woodbury was appointed to the RTC Board, where he recognized a lack of adequate funding for roadways and transit. He said the Board developed a property tax bond issue in 1986 that focused on roads, raising \$88 million.

Mr. Woodbury recalled that in 1989 he announced an initiative to take a four-step process. He said it began by developing a master transportation plan with Clark County that would include streets and arterials as well as a mass transit element. The second part was to have members of the community involved through a committee. He explained that the committee would be responsible for developing a funding plan. The funding plan included six elements or funding sources, which included motor vehicle fuel tax, room tax, development tax, government services tax, aviation fuel tax and sales tax earmarked for transit. This went to the voters in 1990 as Question 10, where it passed with 64 percent approval. Subsequently, he recounted, the Nevada Legislature passed it in 1991.

Mr. Woodbury highlighted the transition of transit from private to public and the start of the Citizens Area Transit in 1992. He said the public transit system has always been operated by private contractors, beginning with ATC Vancom in 1992. The private contractors have consistently used union drivers and mechanics.

To demonstrate how much has changed over time, Mr. Woodbury presented the difference in the transit guide. He noted that in 1993, the transit guide was a 75-page pamphlet. Today, the transit guide is 234 pages and included route and schedule information, frequently asked questions, rules and information on the RTC website. He reminded the Committee that the RTC would be launching the RideRTC mobile app soon.

Next, Mr. Woodbury detailed the Americans with Disabilities (ADA) Paratransit Service. He said it began on December 5, 1994. He detailed that it is required by ADA to service customers who are

functionally unable to use fixed route transit. The service must run ³/₄ of a mile outside the fixed route service area. He noted that the Committee would hear more about it at a later meeting. He wanted to point out that while the vehicles and equipment receive federal funding, operations comes from the RTC's budget. He emphasized that while it costs the RTC \$36 per ride, it is a worthy service for those who need it

Mr. Woodbury then detailed the increase in frequency from 1994 to today. He said it has increased to 87 percent. He commented on the tremendous growth in ridership.

Next, Mr. Woodbury highlighted the expansion of RTC operations with the opening of the RTC's first bus yard, the Integrated Bus Maintenance Facility (IBMF), in 1997. He noted that it was 80 percent federally funded. Then in 1999, the RTC Administration building opened.

Additionally, Mr. Woodbury explained, with the growth of the transit system, the RTC needed to hire a general manager who would be able to develop relationships and partnerships in the business community. Mr. Jacob Snow was hired in 1999 to manage the RTC.

** Mr. Peter Guzman returned at 3:56 p.m.

In 2000, the Las Vegas Monorail (Monorail) was developed. Mr. Woodbury discussed the obstacles in the initial phase of the Monorail, noting that over time and after going through Chapter 11 Bankruptcy, the Monorail was able to reorganize its debt. In the end, he said the Monorail moves large numbers of people, reducing the amount of people that might be in vehicles on the roadways. He said that the Monorail is operating with a profit now. Furthermore, he explained that Clark County and the RTC were discussing an extension to the system to Mandalay Bay and adding a station at the Sands Expo center. This would connect all of the major convention facilities.

Mr. Paul Enos asked what the ridership numbers are during peak conventions. Mr. Woodbury said it amounts to over a hundred thousand riders. Last year, the Monorail saw 5 million riders.

Chair Snyder introduced Mr. Snow to continue the presentation. Mr. Snow explained that when he joined the RTC, it was not doing well financially. There was major growth in the Las Vegas Valley and outpaced the RTC. He briefly reviewed the funding sources as mentioned before. He said the RTC put together a community coalition, similar to TRAC, to help move beyond where it was.

As a result of Question 10, Mr. Snow continued, the RTC took over the operations of the Freeway and Arterial System of Transportation (FAST). This was the beginning of the first real regional traffic signal coordination.

Mr. Snow indicated that every transit system faces two pressures: being a social service and handling special requests. He explained that the transit system has to have structure and follow protocols to be fair and efficient. These two pressures can be contradictory and difficult to manage.

Mr. Snow described some of the major strides the RTC made in service and locations. He detailed the first Park and Ride located at the South Strip Transfer Terminal, which opened in 2003. On June 30, 2004, the RTC announced the opening of the Metropolitan Area Bus Rapid Transit System (MAX), the first bus rapid transit (BRT) line in Southern Nevada. Later, the RTC introduced the double-decker buses which allowed the expansion of transit services.

Then Mr. Snow discussed the expansion of maintenance facilities with the opening of the Sunset Maintenance Facility in 2009. The RTC also introduced the streetcar, which was referred to as the Ace Gold Line. This vehicle was ideal since the RTC did not have the means to fund light rail. He compared it to light rail as a train on tired.

Mr. Enos asked what the return on investment was for the different vehicles compared to light rail. Mr. Snow said it costs two to three times as much to put in light rail, but the return on the investment was determined by where it would go. Mr. Enos asked if the buses are replaced more frequently than a rail car. Mr. Snow said the buses are replaced approximately every 12 years, whereas there are other costs associated with rail maintenance, including straightening wheels, etc. He said those aspects make the rail line more expensive than the BRT. He added that the BRT was the RTC's opportunity to prove the market if an additional investment would be warranted.

Mr. Snow then detailed the introduction of express routes and BRT routes. He explained that people want to get places fast, with as few stops as possible. Additionally, the RTC opened three transit centers in 2010, two of which have Park and Ride locations. He said the Bonneville Transit Center replaced the old Downtown Transit Center.

Mr. Snow left the RTC and Ms. Tina Quigley was chosen as the general manager of the RTC in 2012.

Next, Mr. Snow compared Southern Nevada and the RTC to the transit system in Salt Lake City, Utah. He said that during the same time, Salt Lake City was able to put in commuter rail which encouraged economic development and increased property values.

Ms. MaryKaye Cashman asked what the population of Salt Lake City is. Mr. Snow responded that the service area is just over two million people. He remarked that Salt Lake City was effective at getting federal funds to cover much of the costs for its transit. He said Salt Lake City's ridership is lower than the RTC's.

Mr. Warren Hardy asked what impact Salt Lake City hosting an Olympics had on receiving federal funds. Mr. Snow said that Salt Lake City would not have gotten started without that added factor, noting it paid 80 percent of the costs.

Ms. Yvanna Cancela asked what percentage of the RTC's \$61 million is local funds. Mr. Snow replied that 80 percent is local. He said that the RTC does not have debt for its transit, only roadways.

Mr. Snow then discussed the BRT versus light rail and whether the BRT was successful for determining

the potential for light rail. He said based on ridership compared to that of Salt Lake City, Southern Nevada has proved that light rail could be a success. He closed by saying that there is a demand for mobility and high-quality transit.

Comments:

Following a detailed PowerPoint presentation [attached], Ms. Tina Quigley, General Manager for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), remarked on technology in transportation. She said that there are two million residents in Southern Nevada and by 2025, Clark County is projected to have approximately 2.7 million residents. Furthermore, she continued, Southern Nevada hosts more than 42 million visitors each year, with that number expected to grow to 53.1 million visitors by 2025. This growth will have a great impact to the safety, congestion and capacity of transportation in Southern Nevada. Ms. Quigley highlighted that solutions to these issues are being developed throughout the world. She then presented a video from Sweden on this topic, which focused on autonomous and connected vehicles and the impact they could have on transportation and communities.

Ms. Quigley emphasized that while the ideas for autonomous vehicles and transportation mentioned in the video may be decades away, these ideas are a starting point. She added that the Transportation Resource Advisory Committee and Community Collaboration (TRAC or Committee) had a vital role in suggesting policies Southern Nevada should be considering. She remarked that there are four solutions to combat these issues, which include autonomous vehicles, intelligent infrastructure, connected vehicles and shared mobility. She highlighted that these technologies are currently being developed.

Finally, Ms. Quigley reminded the Committee about the Disruption Ahead summit mentioned earlier in the meeting.

Ms. Mauricia Baca found the video to be interesting. She noticed that there were no bicycles in the video. She wondered how the technology would take bicyclists and pedestrians into account. Chair Don Snyder agreed with that point.

Comments:

Following a detailed PowerPoint presentation [attached], Mr. Raymond Hess, Director of Planning for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), provided an overview of the High Capacity Transit Plan. He referenced a one-page handout that gave a description of the plan scope. Mr. Hess was in search of feedback from the Transportation Resource Advisory Committee and Community

Collaboration (TRAC or Committee). He explained that there has been an evolution of transit over time, but the last system-wide review of the transit system was in 2002. He noted that many aspects of that plan had been implemented, including areas such as park and rides, express routes, etc. He said it was an opportunity to reassess the high capacity transit future needs of the system.

Mr. Hess posed three requests to the Committee: 1) Additions or removal of areas to the scope; 2) Committee members interested in participating on a steering committee for the High Capacity Transit Plan; and 3) Approval of the scope in order to move the High Capacity Transit Plan forward. He explained that staff would incorporate the Committee's feedback into the scope and move forward with procuring the consultant to assist with the study.

Next, Mr. Hess reviewed the various elements of the scope of the High Capacity Transit Plan. The first area was coordination. He said a high profile study such as this requires a large amount of coordination. This would ensure regular communication with stakeholders and the consultant, keeping all involved on the same page, on task and on budget. Additionally, he continued, a major component would be public outreach. There was an expectation to set a new standard for public outreach and to have thorough analysis and alternatives.

The next area, Mr. Hess stated, was transit needs. He said this would be accomplished through peer reviews. He mentioned a comparison with Orlando, Florida due to the similarity in tourism.

Another area, Mr. Hess continued, would be transit supportive land uses. This would look at where transit could be run throughout the Las Vegas Valley and the adjacent land use and how they could positively impact one another. He said this focus was based on Phoenix, Arizona and how transit was not viewed in isolation. He emphasized that transit and land use planning need to be incorporated from the beginning.

Mr. Hess said the next area was transit travel demand. He said there are a lot of different models for this, but it would look at what travel patterns could support. The next area, he said, was corridor screening, which would examine operating routes and should corridors be elevated to light rail. There was also corridor modeling, which would help determine what would attract the most riders. He elaborated by saying that the modeling would evaluate what it would take to have people choose transit over their personal vehicles.

Next on the list was the High Capacity Transit Scenario Evaluation, Mr. Hess explained. He said this would help determine what drives ridership and what the densities are. This would look at existing revenue streams, determining ridership and investment scenarios. Finally, Mr. Hess said, was a cost analysis. This would outline what it would cost for each scenario.

Chair Don Snyder suggested adding emerging technologies to the High Capacity Transit Plan scope as it needs to be factored in the planning process. He then asked how long the study would take to develop the High Capacity Transit Plan. Mr. Hess replied it would take up to 18 months.

Mr. Danny Thompson nominated Mr. Ken Evans to participate on the steering committee. Mr. Evans accepted that nomination and expressed his excitement for the study.

Ms. Cindy Creighton nominated Mr. James Duddlesten to participate on the steering committee. Mr. Duddlesten accepted the nomination. Mr. Duddlesten suggested that possible funding sources should be identified through the study as part of the scope.

Mr. Tom Warden suggested that Mr. Paul Enos participate on the steering committee. He also noted that it would be important to preserve flexibility.

Ms. Judy Stokey commented that technology needed to be a part of the conversation as it will be changing the landscape of funding as it impacts fuel tax revenues.

Ms. Mauricia Baca commented that in terms of modeling corridors, it was important to look at new business development and land use planning. She suggested looking at development districts.

Ms. Shawnna Simmons volunteered to participate on the steering committee, commenting how millennials are the new workforce and want to abandon vehicles. She noted that they are searching for more transit options.

Mr. Hess remarked that he noted the comments and would incorporate them accordingly. Chair Snyder asked if the item should be acted on now or brought back to the Committee. Ms. Angela Castro, Senior Director of Government Affairs and Media Relations for the RTC, said the item would go to the November 10, 2016 RTC Board of Commissioners if the Committee was comfortable with the scope, or it could be held for another meeting. Mr. Warren Hardy suggested the item be moved forward.

Mr. Mike Feldman asked how much the study would cost and commented on the Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) modeling versus rail. Mr. Hess responded that it would cost approximately \$1.8 million. Then Mr. Hess addressed the BRT comments. He said the RTC had enjoyed success with the BRT. He hoped the study would identify which enhanced transit would be the choice option. He said one major influencer is the scalability of BRT versus rail. Each has its benefits and drawbacks.

Mr. Warren Hardy made a motion to approve the scope with the suggested additions.

Draft High Capacity Transit Plan

<u>What</u>: Comprehensive study that will encourage land uses supportive of high quality transit, identify priority transit investments, and develop a coordinated long-range plan for high capacity transit (e.g. bus rapid transit, modern streetcar, light rail).

<u>Why</u>: The previous Las Vegas Valley Transit System Development Plan was developed in 2002 and identified the future transit network for the Southern Nevada. Much of this study has been successfully implemented including our express and rapid bus network, park and ride facilities, and expansion of the system. The time has come to develop a new long-range transit plan which will identify future high capacity transit opportunities.

<u>When</u>: The study is expected to last approximately 18 months and could commence as soon as December 2016.

Who: The RTC is still in the consultant selection process.

<u>Draft Scope</u>: The following is a brief synopsis of the proposed study scope:

- **Project Management & Stakeholder Coordination**—coordination between RTC, a stakeholder advisory committee, and the consultant.
- **Public Outreach** educate and engage community about transit investment strategies and future alternatives using a variety of innovative outreach techniques.
- *Transit Needs, Opportunities and Goals* gather data and define transit performance indicators to define problem using: existing transit assessment; land use framework; previous studies.
- Review Transit Policies and Funding Strategies in Peer Cities comparison of Phoenix, Denver, Salt Lake, San Diego, and Orlando.
- **Transit Supportive Land Use** identify: what density levels are needed to support high capacity transit; what land use changes are needed to support one mode over another (BRT to LRT); what tools are needed to assist local agencies to prepare for high capacity transit.
- Prepare and Evaluate Land Use Scenarios evaluate 2 different land use scenarios to determine
 1) what is the economic feasibility of achieving high capacity transit supportive density;
 2) what is the geographic coverage of the high capacity network based on market analysis, land use scenarios, transit productivity, etc.
- **Transit Travel Demand** analyze transit travel demand patterns by subarea, corridor and time period; define market segments relevant to transit mode.
- **Corridor Screening** analyze up to 25 corridors across the region and identify the most promising for high capacity transit.
- Corridor Modeling analyze which transit technologies along which corridor would attract the
 most riders.
- High capacity transit system plan scenarios analyze how various high capacity transit corridors could be packaged as a complete system. The three scenarios will be baseline (anticipated operational improvements); medium investment (a moderate financial increase to support routes of regional significance); high investment (high financial increase to make transit competitive with automobiles).
- Cost Analysis develop conceptual cost estimates and potential funding mechanisms for the baseline, medium, and high investment scenarios.
